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INTRODUCTION

About the project

CLICA is a bottom-up, all-inclusive youth project, in support of the European Green Deal, aimed at systemically increasing the policy's impact for youth residing in European peripheries, civic deserts and rural areas. Despite being at the frontline of the climate crisis, these remote communities remain marginalized with their voices rarely heard at local and European levels.

CLICA has created hybrid Youth Assemblies, community spaces with both online and in-person presence. Each local Youth Assembly runs a series of community-building activities, microlearning programmes and workshops – or Open Labs – in collaboration with environmental scientists, multidisciplinary creatives, and policymakers.

The learnings and synergies from these Youth Assemblies were jointly discussed at an EU-level Open Lab in Finland to which each local hub delegated two representatives. These workshops generated solutions that increased the embedding of the European Green Deal (EGD) amongst marginalized youth communities.

Partners, stakeholders and the community capture local and EU-level narratives, helping them assess how interventions and life choices of young people are civic actions that have political significance. This creates a two-way learning and dialogue, which increase the impact of the EGD amongst youth communities as well as empower youth to position themselves at the centre of the change that the policy is aiming to have.

Local Change Labs aims

Partners and youth defined together strategy and programme (sustainability plan) to keep Local Youth Assemblies alive, for them to become a long-lasting and forward-looking youth community. These will be committed to cluster youth, policymakers, civil society and to supporting further youth-led projects at the local and EU levels.

Together they developed a sustainability plan for the Labs and start figure out future actions to be undertaken for their further exploitation (e.g. other funded actions). At least two years after the end of the project, participants in Assemblies and Change Labs will be contacted in

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order to gain feedback about their educational choices and career plans and boost their participation in Local Change Labs, while the partnership will identify appropriate European events to keep on transferring their results to the key policymakers.

Purpose of the document

This document aims to present the sustainability plan drafted in each country's Youth Assembly to move onto stable organisations. For this session, partners were free to choose the way of calling together the Local Assembly (in-person, online or hybrid). At the session partners could invite facilitators, trainers, changemakers, youth organisations' representatives, etc. to assist the process with their experience.

LOCAL CHANGE LABS

Summary of local Sustainability Reporting & Planning

CSI - CYPRUS

Cyprus Youth Assembly conducted two sessions to define a Sustainability plan. The Assembly agreed (rate 4) to move on to a stable organization and become a Local Change Lab. The Assembly needs to remain alive because youth need to guide the way for a sustainable future. The main criteria for a project to be sustainable is to be motivated, to have free time to participate, and acquire the skills to find funding opportunities. There are several stakeholders the Local Change lab can reach either during networking events or online. Such stakeholders are public bodies (e.g. Cyprus Youth Board, Municipalities, Deputy Ministry of Culture, Municipalities), organisations, NGOs, education centres (e.g. YEU, Friends of the Earth, CYENS- Centre of Excellence), Ecological movements and initiatives (e.g. Fashion Revolution Cyprus, Young Cyprus Greens), and relevant festivals. In collaboration with such stakeholders, the group can implement various activities, such as: open discussions, awareness events and workshops, awareness campaigns on social media, comic books with informative content, and participate in relevant festivals.

CAMINOS - SPAIN

The Spanish Youth Assembly held a face-to-face session to define a Sustainability Plan.

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The Assembly intends to become a stable organisation. The fact that a 3 (neutral) has been marked in the last point of the table is simply due to the difficulties involved in being a group of participants from different locations, and the fact that for all of them it is the first time they are going to look for funding in order to ensure the sustainability of their project, but the intention and the desire are very present.

The members of the assembly have different profiles, but they are united by their environmental commitment and their belief that a more sustainable planet is not only necessary, but also feasible, and that they have time to become activists for change and a better future for their generation and those to come.

The main criteria for a project to be sustainable are, as outlined in the table, funding, a place to meet, contact with experts who have experience in the field, support and interest, and motivation and desire as a driving force. As detailed below, they already have points in their favour, and there is involvement of some local authorities, so they are starting from a good base. They also already have some knowledge of where they can go for funding, as well as information about the Erasmus+ programme and the opportunities it offers them.

There are several already identified stakeholders that the Youth Assembly can reach out to, either during networking events or online, such as youth and other associations, NGOs, local authorities, territorial youth councils, educational centres and cultural spaces: CIS, Youth Council of Andalusia, town councils, Create, Almijara, ADAPA, Rurales en Red, etc. In collaboration with these stakeholders, the group can carry out various activities, such as awareness-raising workshops, social media campaigns, creative competitions, etc.

IMEALL - IRELAND

The sustainability plan for the Local Youth Assembly in Ireland, led by IMEALL consists of eight participants, including youth interested in traditional arts and facilitators who are musicians and researchers. This assembly focuses on advocating for climate action in rural Irish-speaking areas, contrasting with similar English-speaking, urban initiatives. Sustainability factors include securing resources like space, funding, and mentors. Planned activities involve promoting a video created through the CLICA project to support local biodiversity and water protection efforts, running more Open Labs to engage younger participants, and creating art for the Bánú campaign against the housing crisis. They also aim to partner with researchers from Trinity College Dublin and Dublin City University for participatory research on environmental activism and potentially start a citizen science campaign for water monitoring. The group's commitment to becoming a stable organization is rated at 3 out of 5.

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LATRA - GREECE

The Greek Youth Assembly held several face-to-face sessions to define its Sustainability Plan. The Local Change Labs were designed to ensure that the youth assemblies continued their work on climate action and civic engagement. In Greece, the focus was to create a practical, action-oriented sustainability plan that addresses key areas such as securing funding, building partnerships, and maintaining community engagement. The assembly is committed to staying active through continued collaboration with local organizations, environmental groups, local authorities, and other relevant stakeholders to promote long-term action. The sustainability plan includes organizing awareness-raising campaigns, ensuring ongoing education and training, and identifying key partners to support youth-led initiatives. Additionally, the youth assembly aims to participate in public events related to sustainability, fostering long-term engagement and promoting civic involvement. With a focus on strategic decision-making, the plan will help to ensure that the assembly's efforts remain impactful and sustainable. Latra's commitment to becoming a stable organization is rated at 4 out of 5.

Hyvärilä - FINLAND

The Sustainability Plan for the Local Change Lab in Finland, organized by Hyvärilä Youth and Holiday Centre, involves transforming the project outcomes into a Nature School Change Lab. This initiative will integrate CLICA methodology into a program offered to school groups across Finland, making climate and sustainability education accessible to young people as part of Hyvärilä's regular activities. The CLICA program will allow students to explore Agenda 2030 and the European Green Deal during camp schools or visits to Hyvärilä's Nature School, preserving the project's impact through ongoing programs rather than relying on specific individuals. For sustainability, the center will update its program offerings to include clear descriptions of CLICA activities, allowing schools to choose workshops on sustainability and envisioning a greener future. Staff training is planned for both the Youth Team and seasonal instructors to facilitate these activities. Hyvärilä will collaborate with local schools and biology teachers in Nurmes and Valtimo to bridge formal and non-formal learning. The CLICA methodology will be embedded in the "Sustainable Future Workshop," reaching up to 9,000 young people annually through camp schools. Hyvärilä's commitment to becoming a stable organization is rated at 5 out of 5.

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MATERAHUB - ITALY

The Italian Youth Assembly held a face-to-face session to define a sustainability plan. The “Local Change Labs” took place after the completion of the “Open Labs.” Their main goal was to create sustainability plans for our local youth assemblies, ensuring that our efforts lead to lasting community engagement and climate action.

Their goals include developing a comprehensive sustainability plan that addresses environmental, social and economic aspects. We want to connect with key stakeholders in their community, create a detailed action plan, and raise awareness about sustainability practices. Continuing education and training are essential to stay informed and motivated as they work toward these goals.

For the project to remain sustainable, they believe they must focus on several key factors: securing continued funding through grants, donations and partnerships is critical.

Assistance from experienced people can also help make strategic decisions. In addition, active involvement in their community, continuing education and clear communication are all key to keeping o assembly active and impactful. To achieve these goals, they are working on identifying relevant partners, such as environmental representatives.

The Assembly intends to continue working together and carry on the format it has used during the Youth Assemblies held this past year, but the intention to stabilise into a stable organisation was not made clear. Certainly, the difficulty involved in being a group of participants from different places gave great weight to the choice. The youth assemblies were held both in the area of Matera and in the area of Sora (Fr), so we thought of continuing to propose ourselves for events related to sustainability in both places without necessarily considering themselves a single organisation but part of the same movement. In fact, on 7/8 September they were invited to participate in a festival where we will bring the CLICA project and the good practice of the swap party. To make it sustainable and create follow-ups, they worked with local organisations and other associations that already had plans to focus on environmental sustainability and youth activism. Materahub’s commitment to becoming a stable organization is rated at 4 out of 5.

PRO PROGRESSIONE - HUNGARY

Partners and youth defined together a strategy and a programme (Sustainability Plan) to keep the Local Youth Assemblies alive, so that they become a long-lasting and forward-looking youth community. They will commit to bring together young people, policymakers and civil society and to support other youth-led projects at local and EU levels.

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Together they developed a Sustainability Plan for the Labs and started figuring out future actions to be undertaken for their further exploitation (e.g. other funded actions). At least two years after the end of the project, participants in Assemblies and Change Labs will be contacted in order to gain feedback about their educational choices and career plans and boost their participation in Local Change Labs, while the partnership will identify appropriate European events to keep on transferring their results to the key policymakers. Pro Progressione's commitment to becoming a stable organization is rated at 3 out of 5.

Commitment to move into a stable organization

The commitment to move into stable organizations among the Local Youth Assemblies varies across countries but is driven by a shared dedication to sustainability and climate action. In Cyprus, the Youth Assembly rated their commitment at 4, emphasizing the importance of youth leadership in shaping a sustainable future and collaborating with stakeholders for activities like workshops and awareness campaigns. In Spain, despite logistical challenges, the assembly is committed, rated at 3, with participants focused on gaining funding and building partnerships. Ireland's assembly, rated at 3, aims to create ongoing programs for rural climate advocacy, while Greece, rated at 4, focuses on community engagement through partnerships and events. Finland's commitment, rated highest at 5, involves integrating sustainability education into regular activities for up to 9,000 youth annually. Italy's assembly, rated 4, works on creating impactful actions locally, while Hungary's assembly commits to a long-term vision, supporting youth-led projects at local and EU levels and fostering collaboration among youth, policymakers, and civil society. Each assembly demonstrates varying but strong levels of commitment to becoming enduring, impactful organizations.

Youth is the future of society – so youth need to be change makers - in order to save the community in the future.</p>
Key factors for project sustainability	<p><i>What are the main criteria for a project to be sustainable? What are the needs of the Local Youth Assembly in order to remain alive? (e.g. physical space, funding, mentors)</i></p> <p>If someone participates in a project on a voluntary basis, it is important to have the motivation to be active. A motivation could be the fact that participation in such activities can enrich the volunteer's CV.</p> <p>Also, someone needs to have free time to contribute to the project. Usually, volunteers are active only for a short period. An ideal target group is school and university students, who have no other commitments and are able to participate. Also, people are already gathered in these places, so it's easier to implement activities.</p>

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	<p>Also, funding is important. There are several stakeholders offer funding opportunities such as – Youth board of Cyprus, Deputy Ministry of Culture, Municipalities and other small organisations. There are also funding programmes like Erasmus+ and Creative Europe that provide opportunities for youth to implement their projects. In this case, a group of people needs to apply for funding and another group to undertake the creative part of the project. There are opportunities to cultivate funding and administrative skills, but people need time to participate in such trainings.</p>

<p>Key factors for project sustainability</p>	<p><i>What are the main criteria for a project to be sustainable? What are the needs of the Local Youth Assembly in order to remain alive? (e.g. physical space, funding, mentors)</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Funding: for a project to be sustainable over time and to have a real impact, it needs funding. To be eligible for funding, there are different ways, for example, to formally create an association in order to receive grants; another option is to develop local solidarity projects within the framework of the Erasmus+ programme. 2. Meeting place: while it is true that certain follow-up or brainstorming meetings or evaluation of initiatives can take place online, for some activities a physical place to meet, to implement, to store material and to foster a sense of belonging to the cause is necessary. 3. Expertise: setting up an association or an action or working group is not easy without help, especially when it comes to seeking grants or funding to bring the project to fruition. This is why having experts in various fields is essential, especially at the beginning (a very positive factor of local solidarity projects in the Erasmus+ programme is that they can include funding for expert support in the management of the submitted project). 4. Support from the competent authorities in particular and the community at large: the success of the

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	<p>initiative depends not only on the direct participants in the assemblies, but also the impetus of political decision-makers (especially at the local level), various stakeholders and also the community at large. The impulse of all of them is essential, and in order to achieve this, it is possible to stress the fact that they will benefit in the short or long term from all the activities that are put in place, as they are an asset for the territory.</p> <p>5. Willingness and commitment: all of the above is irrelevant without the full commitment and awareness of the participants in the assemblies. Maintaining enthusiasm and purpose and fighting to bring an initiative to fruition is essential to make it a reality and to ensure that it is maintained over time, ‘infecting’ those who come after it to guarantee sustainability.</p>

How could you get in touch with them?</i></p> <p><i>Local group Bánú is already organised to protest the housing crisis that is disproportionately affecting the Gaeltacht and making it very hard for young people to stay and live in their home area.</i></p> <p><i>Bánú is also led by young people and we are all part of that group as well. We see the housing crisis and climate crisis as interlinked, and we see ourselves as being able to offer something valuable to the Bánú group, as the arts are such a powerful tool for activism.</i></p> <p><i>We are already collaborating with the local County Council via the Biodiversity Officer, and the Local Authorities Waters Programme (LAWPRO). - Disseminate the video we created from the CLICA project, which was supported by the local County Council, and use it to promote the County Council's biodiversity plan and the LAWPRO Blue Dot water protection programme in the area.
- Run further editions of our final Open Lab as the format was very effective but we would like to get more younger people involved, and maybe run it in different areas.
- Create an artistic offering for the Bánú campaign
- Work with researchers from Trinity College Dublin and Dublin City University to conduct some participatory action research on perceptions of people in our area towards environmental activism that uses the arts, Irish language and cultural heritage.
- Possibly start a local citizen science campaign on water monitoring and protection.

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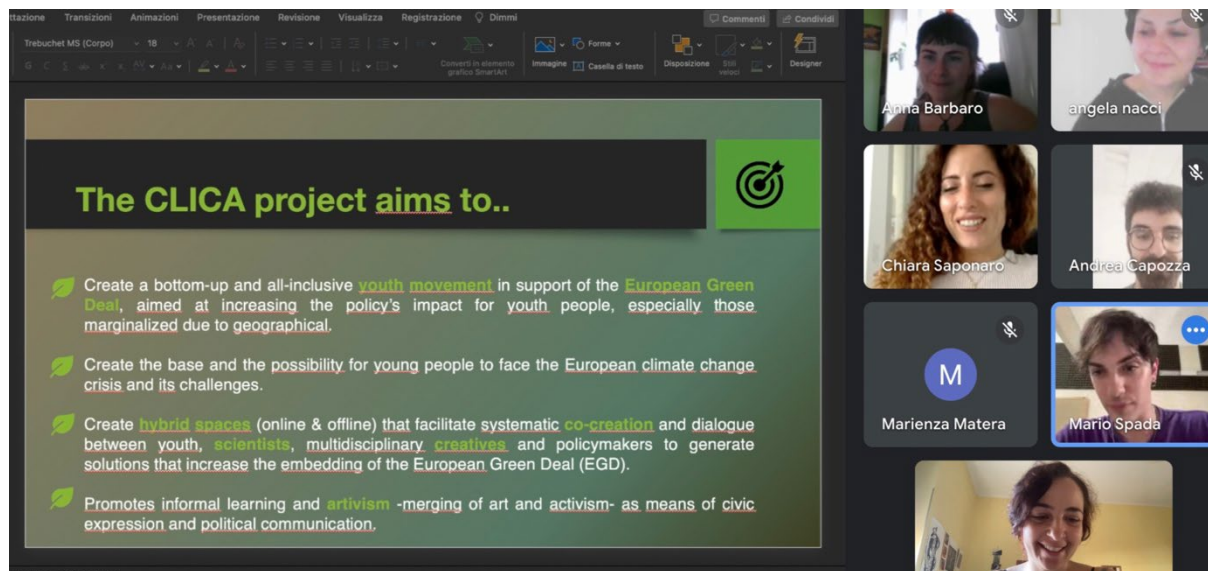
